from the Pastor's desk

Last month I wrote about the phrase “being the church,” part of our logo for *Take It to the Street* Sunday. That Sunday was a great success, thanks to the many people Kathleen mentions in her wrap-up article on page 4. This month I want to reflect on some related themes, drawn from experiences in the past couple of weeks.

For reasons that I won't detail (involving some goofs on my part!), our family was without a functioning water heater last Thursday-Tuesday. As problems go, it was a minor inconvenience — we traveled to the YMCA or to my mother's apartment at Eastlake Terrace for showers — and my family took it with grace. But, coming so soon after the CROP Walk, it led me to think about how we take for granted having clean, safe, plentiful, hot and cold running water — something that would be an unbelievable luxury to much of world's population.

I recently heard an interview with William Kamkwamba, the rural Malawian teenager who “harnessed the wind” by looking at pictures in a library book, designing and building a functioning windmill out of old bicycle parts and scrap, and using it to power a well. (His story is told in a recent book, “The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind.”) The purpose of all that work and creativity? So the women in his village wouldn't have to spend hours every day carrying water.

In our comfortable lives, it's easy for us to forget the daily lives of the rural poor, or the urban poor for that matter, in developing nations. How is it that millions of people are still living in such primitive conditions that they lack water? How is it that millions of children die each year from diseases related to lack of safe drinking water? Such lives are almost inconceivable to us.

I thank God for Church World Service and the CROP Walk which build some bridges of caring between our world and theirs. And it makes me think about aspirations. Much of the world aspires to simply have the basic necessities of life. To what do we aspire?

The awarding of the Nobel Peace Prize to President Obama also brings up the topic of aspirations. I won't go into the pros and cons of that choice, about which there is obviously disagreement. But clearly it was an “aspirational” award — an award given not for past achievement, but in hopes of encouraging certain future actions. According to scholars, “aspirational” Nobel Peace Prizes are not uncommon, as the committee sometimes seeks to influence public policy by choosing a recipient actively engaged in the political arena. You may or may not favor President Obama's strategies, but I believe he not only aspires, but is committed to act, to try to move the world toward a safer, more peaceful future.

If you were to receive a prize for your aspirations, what prize would it be? Would your aspirations include “big picture” issues? World peace, perhaps, or the spread of the gospel? Justice and equity for all of God's children? A greener environment or a more sustainable economy? Reconciliation among the races and nations? Or are your aspirations more local and personal: just to get by, to know some peace and happiness, to love and be loved? Or are they even more self-focused, involving only personal pleasure or wealth or entertainment?

The gospel of Jesus Christ, as I understand it, speaks powerfully to our personal aspirations for love and peace, for belonging and reconciliation, for hope and healing (though not much to our aspirations for pleasure or wealth or entertainment). We can find love and grace and personal peace in Christ. But the gospel is not limited to our personal aspirations; it is always connected to God's aspiration, God's will. God has “big picture” aspirations (in N.T. Wright's words) “to put the world to rights.” I would like to encourage you to enlarge your aspirations, to embrace more of God's will for all people.

And, of course, aspiration without commitment isn't worth much. Paul writes *I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus*. (Philippians 3:14). The “heavenly call” of God is not just to go to heaven; it is to make the world more like heaven. I invite you to reflect on your highest aspirations — and to “press on” to help make them a reality.



This November we will continue studying the Old Testament characters and then start on Isaiah. Learning about the Old Testament helps us to understand the New Testament and the fulfillment of the prophecies of old. The kids are learning more than just the stories, they are getting some important background on these characters as well. There is an activity or craft with each lesson. We still need Sunday School teachers for the lower two grade classes: yellow - 3's to kindergarten and red - first to third grades. Please, we really need you to teach for a month of

Sundays. The children are learning so much and you have no prep work to do at all! It's all ready for you every Sunday morning.

Come and see what joy teaching Sunday School can bring.

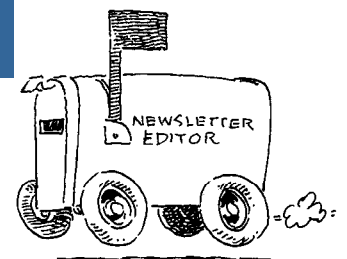


Chuck Vetter Recognized

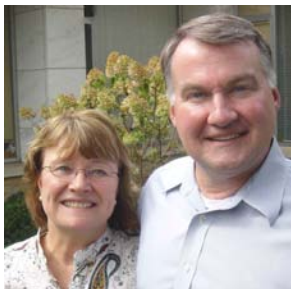
The great thing about the Fellowship Team is that it has no members and that it has many, many, members. That's because there are such a variety of activities, events, and ways of meeting the purpose of the Fellowship Committee. That purpose is to provide members, friends, and guests of First Presbyterian Church with opportunities for socialization, interaction, and sharing across all worship services, inside and outside of the church facility. These opportunities sometimes encompass weekly events, such as **Hospitality Hour**. At times, they involve seasonal activities, like **F.E.A.S.T** groups and participation on **sports teams**. At other times, the opportunities come in the form of special events: **Advent Dinner**, **Congregational Dinners**, **Worship in the Park**, and the **Luau**.

No one committee with a fixed and finite membership could possibly take on all these things. So it is that the committee membership is fluid from week to week or based on the season or special event. Right now committee members are especially needed for Hospitality Hour and for the Advent Dinner.
