They Google not, neither do they Twitter."

Yes, I have a Facebook page. I even went to a seminar and set up a Facebook page for our church (separate from the active page for the Bridge, *The Bridge at First Pres*). But I don't really use either one. I've read of the dangers — how marketers troll Facebook to gain personal data — and I haven't taken time to learn how to use it wisely. I've seen how much time my sons spend on Facebook, and I've been leery of the "time sink." I already spend too much time facing a computer screen; why would I want to spend even more? So, I've been reluctant to add new friends to my Facebook page (*my apologies to those readers whose "friend requests" have been ignored!*). And as to the church's Facebook page, I simply haven't had time to set it up correctly or to monitor it. To update an ancient phrase: *Mea culpa! Mea digitally culpa!*

By now, some of you are mentally applauding: you, too, have avoided or rejected Facebook and other social media. Other readers are groaning: why is something which seems so natural, so easy, so useful, to so many people — schoolchildren, even! — so difficult for others? This is part of the digital divide, the difference between those who are comfortable with digital and social media and those who aren't.

I have become increasingly aware, however, that the world is indeed changing. Facebook and other social media are becoming ever more popular. Though Facebook itself — which was founded as recently as 2004 — may prove ephemeral, the use of technology to facilitate

Social media. New technology. Tweeting on Twitter. Facebooking (*is that a verb?*). Do those terms fill you with eager anticipation, or are they foreboding?

Like many of my generation, I've tried to stay up with the technology and media revolution. I do more research on Google than in my library of books. I consult Wikipedia far more than I consult my multi-volume encyclopedia. I am learning my way around the inside of a computer as I build one at home (a process in which Murphy's law is much in evidence). My family texts (*is that a verb?*) regularly. But the social media revolution — primarily Facebook and Twitter — has been beyond me.

communication is here to stay. And the church, and I, need to become fluent in whatever media people are using to connect with one another. For Christianity cannot be understood or experienced outside of community. The shape of community may be changing, but its centrality to our faith isn't.

So.... I'll be trying to master Facebook. And we'll soon be updating our church website. As I mentioned, the Bridge has an active Facebook page, and I encourage you to visit it. I'm not prepared to go so far as Twitter — we won't become the "All-Tweets Church" — nor am I likely to start blogging, but I hope we can reach out through the new media, without losing touch with those who prefer more traditional forms of communication.

Watch for further developments. And expect some responses to those outstanding "friend requests."

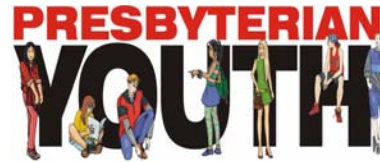

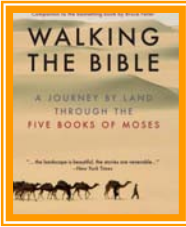

PW Mission Pledge: Presbyterian Women have led the way for mission involvement around the world through the PW Mission Pledge. The Pledge supports programs, resources, scholarships, and much more. During the last triennium, PW contributed \$3.8 million to the denomination. Our own church has a current pledge of \$2,200. This is our largest expenditure. That is why we have the Cookie Walk, which netted about \$1,850. PW pledges from individuals help also. This year, PW will help sponsor two mission coworkers who will focus on women's issues in the Ukraine and in Mexico. Please consider making a contribution to PW. Thank you for your support.

Interim Associate Pastor Search Committee Report

The Interim Associate Pastor Search Committee includes the following members: Stu Barb, Elder, Chairman; Dave Steede; Mindy Weirich; John Hutchings; Aaron Slagel; Freya Burket; Jennifer Pitcher, and Rev. Steve Braden. The representative from Presbytery that works with the committee is Rev. Rebecca Kirkpatrick.

The Interim Associate Pastor we are looking for will have several responsibilities at the church: helping prepare our church for the new (permanent) Associate Pastor, leadership for The Bridge worship services, mission committee and spiritual growth activities for our entire church. The Interim Associate Pastor will not be eligible to become the (permanent) Associate Pastor. The search committee scheduled two interviews with applicants for the interim associate pastor position. One interview will be done by phone for a person located out-of-state. One applicant later withdrew the application. Steve has posted the job opening announcement and the job description on our church website. He has also notified presbyteries and other church-related organizations that are in close proximity to Elkhart about our job opening to ask them to spread the word to any pastors that might have an interest in the position.

Our committee has requested that the Nominating Committee include the nomination of a search committee for the Associate Pastor in the list of positions to be nominated in February. At the January 18, 2011 meeting the Session approved the committee request for an initial budget of \$5,000 for expenses we expect to incur in the hiring process.

Supply pastors will fill the Bridge preaching vacancy until an interim is hired. We have been blessed to have the Rev. Jan Van Lear doing much of our supply preaching so far.

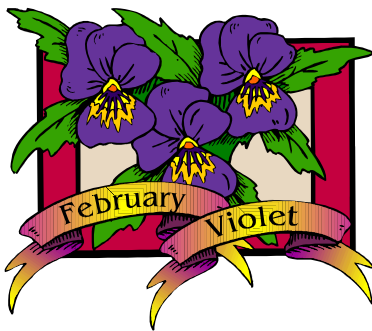

Volunteer Recognition

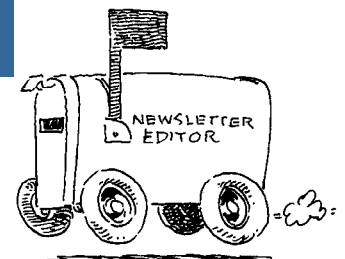
We would like to recognize one of our many regular volunteers who help around the church without acknowledgement or praise. We would like to thank this member for all the many, many times she has helped!

We need the 'gently worn' shoes taking up space in your closet. It is estimated that Americans have 1.5 billion pairs of unworn shoes lying in their closets. We can use each and every one of these pairs to make a tangible difference in someone's life. Around the world, over 300 million children have *no* shoes. Nearly all the footwear that is thrown into our landfills could be used — and treasured as a luxury item — by people in third-world countries.

Soles4Souls aims to recycle and reuse every unwanted pair of shoes in the country by collecting and distributing these shoes to poor people around the world, and has coordinated relief efforts for the Asian Tsunami and Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, netting over 900,000 pairs donated for these disasters. You can help - clean out your closet of any currently unused shoes and drop them off in the boxes at church. (It will help if you bind each pair up with a rubber band.) Mention this project to your friends and neighbors as well! New and used shoes -- dress shoes, tennis shoes, sandals, boots, etc. -- in sizes from infant through adult are being accepted in February.

Because almost two-thirds of the world's HIV infected persons live in Sub-Saharan Africa, many programs exist to address such an overwhelming need. Why then is Malawi Matters necessary? What makes this group essential in the worldwide effort to battle AIDS?

First, and most important, Malawi Matters' training design is unique. Since Malawi is essentially an oral culture, with many who are illiterate and impoverished, our program brings meaningful training at a grassroots level by:

- designing lessons based on storytelling, music, drama, dance, and art – methods and approaches that Malawians already understand, but also best practice strategies .
- equipping key leaders from congregations so that they, in turn, can train those in their constituency, who then continue to pass on the training to others.
- sustaining cost-effective practices, using simple and readily-available supplies.

Second, but also important, Malawi Matters builds relationships, involving everyone in the process in learning and caring for one another by:

- including members of Parliament, tribal authorities, denominational leaders, pastors and church members, city and village persons, as well as staff of NGO's serving Malawi.
- involving our region's expatriate Malawian community in this effort.
- building successful, on-going partnerships with the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, which has the structure in place to deliver services, the reputation for caring, and the trust of the people in the country.
- establishing long-term commitments between congregations and volunteers.
- providing the positive rapport necessary to address negative cultural practices that continue the spread of HIV and AIDS.
- celebrating the mutual learning connection, enriching the lives and understandings of participants and facilitators, and honoring the contributions of all.

Thank you to all who have paid and are paying your capital campaign pledges. Thank you especially to those who made extra payments to enable us to retire our mortgage in November. This was a major milestone — but we're not done!

We have important work yet to accomplish, including our tithe to mission, which will go to CCS' capital campaign (40%), Malawi Matters mission program and projects in Ghana (40%), the Presbytery of Wabash Valley (10%), and Presbyterian Global Mission (10%). The major unfinished project within the original plan is re-roofing the north (Christian Education) wing.

The original campaign commenced in May, 2008, for three years. It will end in May, 2011, and we encourage everyone to complete their pledges by that time. There were several important projects that were not funded in the original campaign, including restroom renovation, new stove and dishwasher for the kitchen, and resurfacing the parking lots. It is anticipated that the trustees will request extending the campaign for a year for these.

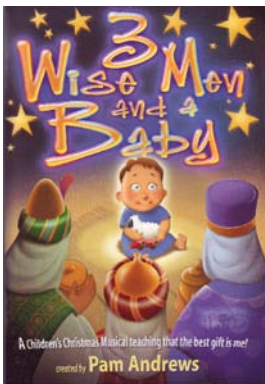
