Go, First Pres...Go, First Pres...

I can't tell you how proud for you I am for all that has been accomplished in the six months since I arrived as your interim associate pastor! (Has it been six months? Seems like just yesterday



that I was introducing you to *genuine* sweet tea...) As you'll read in other parts of the newsletter, a 97% receipt of pledges for your original Capital Campaign (total received \$1,055,000) is stupendously phenomenal in today's economy. And at the tail end of that effort, unsolicited funds appeared for a matching-funds financial campaign that literally wiped your deficit clean, fixed the leaky roof, reinstated the staff salary cuts and will, in the near future, resurface the parking lot, replace broken kitchen appliances, modernize the four most-used restrooms, and service the organ that's needed repair for more than five years. And we can't forget to mention that the church will be able to honor it's pledge of 10% of the total capital campaign funds received (that's \$105,500) for mission. Wow — that's more than incredible! That's downright miraculous in my book.

Oh and, by the way, all the padded chairs used in Bridge worship and fellowship have been pressure-washed, the walls in Bridge worship/Fellowship area have been sealed and freshly painted, the stage has been re-engineered to hide unsightly cables and re-built so the band doesn't wobble mid-song, and a new projector will soon be installed.

If you had any doubt that the Spirit was alive and at work among the people of First Presbyterian, you could look no further than this financial turn-around in a time when neighboring churches are closing. But *do* look further and see that your commitment to living out your vision of being "one church that worships three ways" is perhaps key to this undergirding stability. It's not easy to be divided among worship services and keep feeling like you're one congregation—and surely there are ways we can improve at the ways we do that — but you, indeed, are becoming a model for other large, downtown, mainline congregations who have to change the "way it's always been done" to remain a vital, life-giving presence in their completely-changed communities.

I'm so excited about Phase Two of the interim pastor process — the one we're beginning now. That's the time we dig down deep in our own spiritual lives and call to mind (re-member) the ways and people God has used to touch our lives. By telling these stories to one another (Holy Conversations), we invite the Spirit to prod us creatively to live into the future — to come up with the focus, the means, the programs, the prayer-life we'll need to ensure that God's ways live on in our coming generations. This planning for new pastoral leadership is heady and heart-filled stuff — and we Presbyterians give it due respect in this long process. So in this, your near half-time pep talk, I want you to know that I'm honored to be working among you and tremendously awed at who you are and how you work together. You're well on your way to providing a hope-filled new palette in which the Spirit can work more miraculous, unimagined wonders!

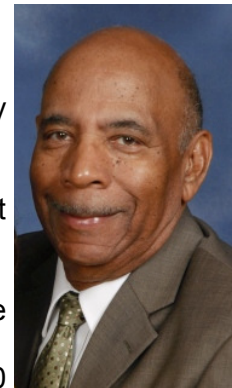

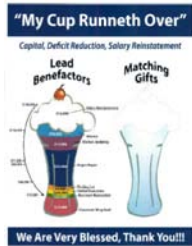

Thank you ALL for a great program. Through the amazing generosity of our lead and matching donors, we were able to fully fund almost all of our projects, and partially fund most of the others. The fact that we were able to raise almost \$190,000 in this economic climate, on the heels of our original capital campaign, speaks volumes about this congregation's faith, generosity, and love for the church. Initial allocation of gifts, consistent with the wishes of our donors, has been approved by our trustees and session. In reviewing these, please note that a substantial sum of "wherever needed" funds are awaiting allocation by the Session and Trustees (which had not been finalized as of this newsletter). Program totals are:

CHURCH FINANCES

Update on current operating budget: We are operating on a short fiscal year, June-December. Through the end of September, we were just barely in the black, due primarily to lower-than-budgeted expenses. Our year-to-date pledged income (a portion of all income) was running about \$7,000 behind the budgeted amount. ***Are you up to date with your pledge?***

Plans for 2012: Because we changed to a short fiscal year after the 2011-12 pledge campaign, existing pledges extend through May, 2012. CWS will also include a brief description of the specific item you have ordered, which you can include with the card you send to the loved one whom your gift has honored.

AFRICA BAGS

Africa Bags are hand-crafted on foot-powered treadle sewing machines by people in the village of Chibanzi in Malawi, Africa. Various fabrics are available including muslin, batik, tie-dye, chitenje (African cloth) and are made as book bags, shopping bags, beach bags, shoulder bags, and more. All proceeds are returned to the people who make them so they have an income to use to buy the basic necessities of life. The workers also put a percentage of these funds into support for the nursery school/orphan center and feeding site/kitchen for their village. Bags range in price from \$10.00 to \$20.00. Buy the bag that is saving lives in Malawi!

SOUP OF SUCCESS

Soup, cookie, and dip mixes or baskets of these items will be available for purchase to benefit **SOUP of SUCCESS (SOS)**. SOS, a program of Church Community Services, is a women's job and life skills training program. Women are encouraged to make positive changes through education, career counseling, hands on business skills and emotional support. One woman said "I am thankful for the women in SOS for being the family and friends that I never had."

Double Chocolate Kiss of Mint Cookie Mix, Cranberry Yogurt Cookie Mix, Chewy Chocolate Peanut Butter Cookie Mix, Positively Potato Soup Mix, Sensational Split Pea Soup Mix, and 20 other soup, cookie, and dip mixes will be available for purchase.

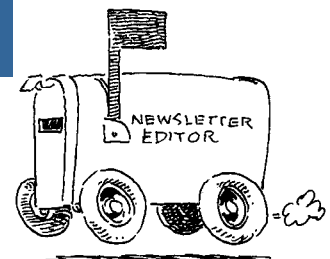
Though our Forward in Faith Together Campaign officially ended in May, members have continued to give to fulfill (and sometimes exceed) their pledges. Through mid-October, we stand as follows:

Pledged: \$1,075,000
 Received: \$1,055,000 (including non-pledged income & scrap)
 Net: (\$ 20,000) = 2% shortfall

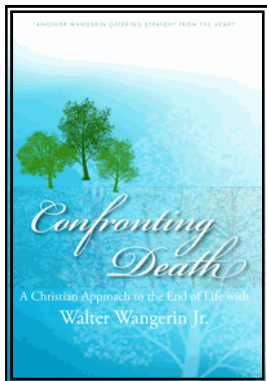

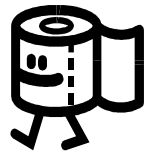
Thank you to the Mission Commission and all who helped, for the hard work preparing and implementing all the facets for Take It to the Street on October 16. It was a great success!
